Analysis and Interpretation of Data

These finding indicate that majority of the adolescents feel mass media is an important source of sex education. The questionnaire's items number 12, 13, 16, 17, 18, 19, and 20 are about how the media helps educate teenagers about sex. Seventy percent of teenagers, both male and female, concur that they utilize the media to learn about issues linked to sex. Adolescents (boys and girls) think that the media has a beneficial influence on sex education in 70% of cases, and in terms of sex relation knowledge, 57% of adolescents (boys and girls) feel that the media is crucial.

The result indicates that majority of adolescents (76% boys & girls) are aware about sex education. They (76% boys & girls) think school should provide sex education. Majority of adolescents got information regarding sex and sexual health primarily from media sources (cable TV, magazines, newspapers, movies, internet and radio), then secondly from school education program, peer group/ classmates and friends.

Conclusions

From the analysis of data, the researcher concluded that majority of adolescents are aware about term 'sex education'. They think sexual education should provide in schools. High percentage of adolescents has positive responses towards sex education. This indicates that level of sex education is moderate among adolescents.

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The majority of adolescents believe that sex education may be obtained from the media. The majority of teenagers concur that the media has a beneficial impact on their sexual education, and both boys and girls feel that the media is crucial in delivering information on sexual relations. The majority of teenagers first learned about sex and sexual health from media (cable TV, magazines, newspapers, movies, internet, and radio), followed by school instruction programs, friends, and peer groups. When adolescents lack interpersonal guidance and first-hand experience in the field of study, they are most reliant on the media for information. Given the current situation, where teenagers may readily access and evaluate mass media content, it is the moral duty of educators to help them make moral decisions by guiding them toward what is desirable and undesirable.
